A WORD FROM

THE CURATOR

Everyone has a story from the fires, the Pilot Hill Arboretum is no different.

As you travel to the Pilot Hill Arboretum in the Bago State Forest it is hard to imagine how anything could have survived. This museum of trees that has its centenary in 2021 has become a place of both solace and celebration

As we approach the one-year anniversary of the fires it is so important to take the time to acknowledge the past year in whatever way makes sense to us. The Dunn's Road Fire ran for fifty days and so now, one year on, Arbour Festival does too.

The artists involved in *Arbour Festiva*l all have connections to the region, most were directly impacted by the fires themselves.

Arbour Festival includes a program of events and activities hosted by local artists and makers that will introduce participants to a new hobby, rekindle an old interest or merely act as a distraction in what is an anxious season for so many.

I invite you to come together during *Arbour Festival* with family, friends and neighbours to enjoy a concert headlined by Tooma's own ARIA Award-winning Fanny Lumsden, our very own Woodland Film Festival or to just quietly reflect in solitude on a self-guided visit through the temporary artworks that will be present amongst the trees of the beautiful Pilot Hill Arboretum

When thinking about the aftermath of the fires, a word that comes to mind is *solastagia*, which references the grief and loss experienced from a sudden change to or loss of our environment. As life goes on and we pick up the pieces, the fire scar is still bare for all to see as we go about our daily lives in what is now the new normal, sharply reminding us of what has happened.

To me, the Arboretum encapsulates this. The vast scale of fire damage to our region is visible from the aptly-named Ash Walk, but you can also marvel at the towering stands of remnant mountain ash, and embrace a still-standing sugar pine. These trees remember how things were, and stand with us as we face the future.

We all have our own anniversary dates from the fire, *Arbour Festival* provides an opportunity to acknowledge what has happened, celebrate what we've achieved and look forward to what's yet to come.

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CONTAINMENT LINES ROBYN VENEER SWEENEY

Over the durtion of the Dunns Road Fire, our emotions were so affected by the success or failure of the 'containment' of this catastrophic blaze.

Pilot Hill Arboretum magically survived almost fully intact, saving a collection of beautiful and unusual tree species, some older than the nearby doomed Sugar Pines. I wonder if it was the proximity of Mountain Ash that formed a 'boundary' to the Arboretum or was it a quirk of the wind that saved this inspiring place.

The golden lines that will surround groups of trees is a reference to *Kintsugi* meaning Golden Joinery. This is a Japanese tradition where something broken is repaired with gold, often making it more precious than when whole.

After the fires, we do what we can to repair what has been broken and see a new beauty in what we achieve.



DARK FOREST SULARI GENTILL

Trees have always stood in the background of our lives, silent witnesses to our joys and tragedies. In the mountains we have taken their abundance for granted, but now, there are spaces where their shade once fell. This work gives voice to the trees of Pilot Hill, assigns them stories of their own beyond that of survival.

Dark Forest is not so much a collaboration, but a collective of authors each contributing their creativity and talent to make the trees speak, and to help the people of this region memorialise and celebrate. They are participating simply because Sulari asked them for help. This in itself is an echo of the generosity we of the Snowy experienced from across Australia and the world during the fires—and so Dark Forest nods to that overwhelming spirit of solidarity in its creation, as much as it commemorates the green giants we lost to the flames, and celebrates what survived.

SIT BENEATH

JUJU ROCHE

Roche's family was directly impacted by the January fires. With homes, properties and stock around the Adelong area, her husband, two brothers in law, sister in law and extended family all fought on the front line defending their farms and the broader community.

Roche aesthetically responds to her experience with 50 oil marked flags... representing the 50 days the fire gave threat. These vibrant and saturated sheets of canvas hang vertically from a grand tree in the arboretum at Pilot Hill

The flags dance and move with the wind (just like the flames), hanging still when calm, and weathering in the environment over the hot months of January and February. Roche hopes to create an installation where people enter the space created by the flags and feel a sense of calm. Visitors will be given the opportunity to sit and look around them, reflect on the year, acknowledge what has been, and feel hopeful for the future.



FOR BATLOW ANDREAS BUISMAN

In early February I came to Australia, to do some commissions.

It was just after the bushfires had stopped, that I decided to donate a sculpture to be auctioned off with funds going to BlazeAid or another charity.

While driving through burnt bush from Thredbo into the Snowy Valleys for a whole day I thought that might be the right thing to do...

On the side of the road I spotted a rock, just outside the heavily affected town of Batlow, next to a burnt house.

The boulder was cracked and scattered by the heat as it sat next to a big gumtree that must have burned for quite a while.

The pattern I gave it's dark grey interior reminds us of the charcoaled logs I saw all day long... beautiful in a scary way.

But before we got the story done everything seemed to stop due to that co... co... corona thing!

As always, not everything meant well turns out well! But you will, in due course, be able to donate towards or bid for this sculpture. In the meantime I have left Australia and the sculpture sits and waits for things to happen!

In my work I polish, clean and transform for the spectator. I respect the given form, don't change but translate the boulders and columns I work with, considering myself a servant to those rocks, which were formed millions of years ago.

My stones are the whales of the land. Cruising Australia and other countries I constantly search for them. In the lucky moments they will lift their mighty bodies out of the earth and make themselves visible. Then the hard work begins: polishing the rough skin for hours I reveal their hidden identity glimpsing the secret of continuance.

It is very important to interact with my work by touching and feeling the rock's smoothness and roughness, coolness and heat. Particularly children are often irresistibly drawn to cuddle, play with and even climb the sculptures - what bigger compliment could I ask for?

UNDERSTORIES

HELEN NEWMAN

Understories is a site-specific treasure hunt that speaks to the dreamer child in each of us. Half hidden amongst the moss, tree stumps, pine cones and leaf matter of the Arboretum a series of very small scale, playful projection works are placed for groups and individuals to discover as they wander along the Pine Walk path.

Fireflies flicker across a burned-out limb, iridescent fingers of light flow up from the base of a tree, a tiny garden of mushrooms sprout from the earth with the help of a young boy's watering can.

As if springing from a child's whimsical imagination, *Understories* creates a secret, magical world where wanderers are enticed to play and discover the unexpected joy contained in these fanciful moments.

Understories is only available for viewing after the sun goes down, at Woodland Film Festival and the Festival finale concert with Fanny Lumsden & the Pack and the Flying Fruit Fly Circus.







GETTING TO THE ARBORETUM


There is currently only one route to Pilot Hill Arboretum (most forest roads are closed to public for post-fire operations. Visit arbourfestival.com for a detailed driving map).

From Batlow (approx 20 mins)

Head along Pioneer

- A Street and turn left onto Bartoman Street-Mill Road.
 - Veer right on to Forest
- B Road, veer left onto Yellowin Access Road.
- Turn right at T junction **C** onto Snubba Road.
- At the end of Snubba
- **D** Road turn left onto Bago Forest Way (Kopsens Road), continue until you reach Pilot Hill Arboretum.

Surface is mostly unsealed.
